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Hayley Boxall Panelist

Hayley Boxall is the Manager for the Violence against Women and Children (VAW&C) Research Program at the Australian Institute of Criminology. Research undertaken as part of the VAW&C Research Program focuses on domestic and family and sexual violence, child sexual abuse, and human trafficking and modern slavery, and the intersections between these forms of violence.

Since joining the Institute 10 years ago, she has published extensively on domestic and family violence (DFV). She has been responsible for the development of monitoring and evaluation frameworks and plans for a range of government programs and interventions. This includes a monitoring and evaluation framework for the Australian National Action Plan to Combat Modern Slavery. Hayley is also an experienced evaluator. She has been a primary investigator on a number of projects including the meta-evaluation of the Preventing Violence against Women and Children Program, the evaluation of the Adolescent Family Violence Program and the evaluation of the Youth Hope Program.

Jenny is Executive Manager at the Anti-slavery Taskforce, Catholic Archdiocese of Sydney and a co-coordinator of the Australian Catholic Anti-slavery Network (ACAN) and Domus 8.7. Jenny has worked as a case manager and advocate for survivors of human trafficking and slavery in the United States and Australia. For ten years Jenny operated Australia's only refuge for women who have experienced human trafficking and slavery including early and forced marriage, a program of The Salvation Army. Jenny has also supported survivors in Australia to engage with policy-makers, communities, the public and their peers. She has participated in the Australian Government's National Roundtable on Human Trafficking and Slavery for a decade and has been appointed to the Modern Slavery Expert Advisory Group and consulted for the US State Department and United Nations.
