Enrol now in the GCHE

The Graduate Certificate in Higher Education (GCHE) is designed to help you to develop your career as a tertiary educator and to contribute directly to extending a culture of excellence in learning and teaching. The GCHE is now

open for enrolments for February commencement. Enrolments will close on **16 January 2023**. <u>Complete the GCHE</u> <u>application process</u>

The course is work-integrated so that you undertake learning activities that are of direct relevance and benefit to you. It aims to model and illustrate good practice and ensure your learning experience is transparently relevant and strategically beneficial.

Teaching academics, including sessional staff and professional staff who have a role leading teaching and learning at either the School or Faculty level are eligible to have their fees waived. Embedding academic skills in your unit in 2023

One of the best ways to ease students' academic skills development is to embed learning support into the units they study. To do this effectively, units can be 'mapped' to work out where to embed what. (1) Resources and services can be matched to assessment tasks and their component parts; for example, hyperlinks to Academic Skills Unit resources can be integrated into the corresponding marking criteria and just-in-time targeted workshops or drop-ins can be strategically scheduled.

Such projects combine the expertise of academic skills advisors and teaching academics to enhance students' engagement and make it easier for them to access relevant learning experiences.

Key decision about using Turnitin in Canvas

In moving to Canvas there were three options available to ACU:

- 1. Turnitin LTI.
- 2. Canvas Plagiarism Framework.
- 3. Offer the option of choosing between them at the assignment level.

CEI worked in consultation with 18 teaching staff to choose Option 3, to allow staff to make a choice between Turnitin and Canvas Plagiarism Framework at the assignment level. The *Turnitin LTI* has a widely used *QuickMarks* feature. Staff indicated that this feature allows them to provide quality feedback efficiently.

The *Canvas Plagiarism Framework* does not have a comparable comment bank feature like *QuickMarks*, but does have some other great features staff liked, including:

- Audio and video feedback
- Enhanced rubrics with grade ranges
- SpeedGrader
- Robust peer-marking and group work options

It is integral that we deliver a consistent experience for students and supporting staff to correctly set up their assignments. To aid this, ACU staff will have access to 24/7 Canvas support (phone or chat) to help with setting up assignments.

O365 Tenant Migration

What is happening?

Reminder, ACU is updating our Microsoft environment to host both staff and students in the same space. This will allow for improved security, enhanced collaboration and pave the way for future projects. Part of this update means that students will not have access to their online Microsoft Office Suite of applications including ACU emails and One Drive for **up to 6 days** from Friday 16 December 2022.

What do I need to do?

If you are teaching in the period from **16 December – 22 December**, please be aware students will not be able to receive or send emails from their ACU email accounts during this time. This includes email notifications they would normally receive from LEO.

If students have any queries, please provide the following advice:

- At this stage, the only item students need to do is update their details in Student Connect, to ensure we can communicate if required during the outage.
- Student information can be found at this <u>AskACU Knowledge Article</u>, and will be updated with specific instructions as the rollout progresses.
- Students can reach out to AskACU as normal both now and during the outage.

Changes to deferred & supplementary central examinations 12 – 16 December 2022

Due to the 0365 Tenant Migration which will remove students access to their email addresses on 16 December, we have decided **not to host any central examinations after 1pm on Thursday 15th December.** If your exam has a window that exceeds 72 hours, it will be automatically reduced to fit within the new deferred/supplementary examination block. Library resources in online units – EZproxy links no longer work

ACU now uses OpenAthens to allow off campus access to library resources. Our previous authentication system, EZproxy, will be decommissioned on 23 December 2022. **EZproxy links in online units will no longer work after this date.**

What do I need to do?

- If you use Leganto reading lists or Library search links, you don't need to do anything. The Library is updating Leganto lists for you.
- Links created using EZproxy will need to be updated.
 (Look for links that have ezproxy, ezproxy1, ezproxy2 or ezproxy3 anywhere in the URL.)
- Use the <u>OpenAthens link generator/converter</u> to create new links to library resources or update existing links.

• Check all links in your LEO or Canvas units before they start. Remember, it's best to check links when you are off campus and not on the VPN to replicate the student experience.

Reducing the cost of textbooks for students

The cost of textbooks can often be a barrier for students, particularly students from low SES backgrounds. Students who are unable to afford textbooks find it more difficult to succeed at university as they do not have easy access to the material they need for their course.

There are options available if you wish to prescribe a textbook that is available at no cost to your students:

- <u>Open Educational Resources</u> (OERs) are available at no cost to the university (and students) and can be reused, shared and adapted for your students.
- You can develop your own OER that meets the specific needs of the students in your course.
- You can work with Library staff to identify a suitable online alternative to a print textbook from an academic publisher.

These online resources not only make university a little more affordable for students but also allow students to access material at any time and from any place with an internet connection.

Embedding transition pedagogy for success

Education Pathways launched Foundation Studies in 2020 and five new Diploma Programs in 2022 – Business, Information Technology, Exercise Science, Biomedical Science and Nutrition Science. As the programs offer entry to students who are ineligible to directly enter bachelor course(s), the curriculum design, implementation and delivery have been carefully developed to optimise the student experience and success. The Transition Pedagogy framework based on the six fundamental principles has been key in scaffolding, mediating and supporting student learning and success (see for example Kift, 2008)

Foundation and Diploma units all use an engaging approach to pedagogy, curriculum design, and learning and teaching practices, which are embedded both holistically and individually within the units to support and enhance student-



centred learning. This framework is based on a progressive and developmental approach to learning where implicit expectations embedded within teaching, learning and assessment practices are made *explicit* within the curriculum design and through active and interactive classroom practices. Vesna Stefanov (Pathways Curriculum Manager) recently received the 2022 ACU Vice-Chancellor Staff Excellence Award in the category of Service Excellence for this Curriculum Project. Evaluation of the programs is continuing. Student and staff feedback is incorporated into future iterations of the programs.

- Use a general discussion forum in your LEO unit to encourage students to ask unit questions there.
- Regularly monitor the LEO unit forums.
- Individual correspondence, if required during this time can be done through LEO Messaging.

Please note staff emails will NOT be affected during this time. Only student emails are affected. If you have any concerns or questions, please email <u>CEI@acu.edu.au</u>, CEI will collate all feedback and queries to present to ACU IT 0365 Tennant Merger Project Working Group.

Communications to students about the change will be commencing in the near future, with more detail for both staff and students to follow.

New Declaration of Interest Policy & Procedure

ACU has a new <u>Declaration of Interest Policy</u> and <u>Procedure</u> that applies to all staff and affiliates (contractors, suppliers, consultants and agents employed by ACU). Please familiarise yourself with the Policy and Procedure.

There are many definitions of what constitutes a conflict of interest. As a member of staff, you need to ensure that you are familiar with these definitions and can identify where a conflict or potential conflict may exist or need to be declared. You also need to ensure that you recognise situations where there could be foreign interference.

To assist you, a Declaration of Interest Self-assessment Guide (See Appendix 1) has been developed.

For further guidance, please review the Knowledge Base articles on <u>Conflicts of Interest</u> and <u>Foreign Interference</u>.

How to make a declaration

Where a declaration of interest or potential conflict of interest has been identified, you are required to disclose this to your supervisor. You and your supervisor will need to agree a plan to manage the interest or potential foreign interference matter as well as complete an online declaration via Service Central to ensure that the disclosure is appropriately recorded. All declarations need to be recorded, even where a conflict may not exist.

Canvas Implementation Project

As you may know, ACU is moving to a new Learning Management System (LMS) – Canvas.

We are confident Canvas will transform the educational experience for staff and students and meet the increasing demand for mobile technology. It has been a busy month on the ground as our <u>project team</u> works hard to ensure the project is powering along in readiness for the launch in mid-2023.

In time, all LEO units from the previous year will be migrated across to Canvas.

What does this mean for you?

At this stage, it's business as usual. In time, we will migrate your units from Moodle to Canvas using an automated process as well as manual interventions where required. View the <u>Moodle and Canvas Tool Comparison</u> for a list of Moodle activities and resources, how they migrate and their equivalent tool in Canvas.

What can I do to prepare?

If you have capacity and you're eager to start before you have access to Canvas, there might be some changes you can make in your current LEO site. We know the lesson activity doesn't migrate and there is no compatible tool in Canvas. If your current LEO site uses the lesson activity, you can convert it into a series of HTML pages that can be imported directly into Canvas. There is a guide to getting your lesson activity ready for migration on the LMS project website.

Do your students have the literacy and maths skills to successfully complete assessments?

As students prepare for their first assessments, it's a strategic point to remind them of the resources available to help build their academic language, learning and math skills.

INSPIRE

You may already know that the Centre for Education and Innovation's <u>INSPIRE</u> project can support you in a number of ways but what goes on behind the scenes?

Who are we?

INSPIRE is made up of 11 ambassadors from across ACU's campuses. Our ambassadors bring a wealth of various experiences and background knowledges with them. You can learn more about each ambassador <u>here</u>.

What do we do?

INSPIRE ambassadors work across three distinct teams that enact the core work of INSPIRE:

- The *curate team* seek out and review the highest-level evidence in higher-education.
- The *create team* engage in research to obtain the highest-level evidence in higher-education when no rigorous, up-to-date evidence already exists.
- The *disseminate team* bring teaching staff closer to scholarly evidence to inform learning and teaching decisions.

Upcoming upgrade to Allocate+

Allocate+ will soon be updated to the newest version, which will allow Timetabling and Room Bookings to:

- edit activity messages and buffers in bulk within and across units
- make combinations of activities, allowing easier allocation for students
- generate reports
- export bespoke data.

It also uses a more intuitive interface. These changes are expected to have a positive impact on faculty staff workload, allowing changes to be made faster. We are currently conducting testing and expect to upgrade the system in August 2022.

Training

As the new version of Allocate+ has upgraded functionality and a new user interface all users will need to undergo training. The **2022** Allocate+ is not affected by these upgrades and functionality remains the same.

We hope to conduct this training from mid-August and run sessions weekly until the beginning of October in time for Allocate+ to open to students for preference entry Semester 1, 2023.

Once training dates are finalised, we will communicate them and any other information required via email, Workplace and the Staff Bulletin.

Business Process Management Training

Business Process Management Training is being offered for the second half of 2022. With an objective to teach staff how to simplify work processes, deliver better services, highlight how you can improve your work and clarify roles. Training will provide an opportunity to improve stakeholder experience, increase efficiency, quality and consistency.

You will also find the training useful if you are working with lengthy manuals or cumbersome Visio diagrams that can often be difficult to navigate. ACU uses Promapp to assist with business process management. Promapp can be used to document processes clearly and is easily accessible by your team and other staff.

This training is suitable for anyone responsible for:

- the day-to-day management of processes (usually managers, supervisors, team leaders etc.)
- the day-to-day delivery of processes (usually a staff member who routinely performs the process)
- departmental process improvement or business analysis
- both academic and professional staff

Library resources in online units – transition from EZproxy to OpenAthens

Beginning July 2022 ACU Library is transitioning from EZproxy to use OpenAthens for remote authentication to Library resources. This means that some links to articles, ebooks, ebook chapters and databases will need to be updated.

The OpenAthens single sign on for authentication is more flexible, secure, and reliable than the current EZproxy IP based service.

What do I need to do?

- If you use Leganto reading lists or Library search links, you don't need to do anything.
- Links created using EZproxy will need to be updated. (You are looking for links that have ezproxy, ezproxy1, ezproxy2 or ezproxy3 anywhere in the URL.)
- Start updating now using our OpenAthens link generator/converter. Not all databases are yet working with the generator. More will be added as the transition progresses.

- Check all links in your LEO or Canvas units after July 11 and before the beginning of semester 2 and update any that no longer work. Remember, it's best to check links when you are off campus and not on the VPN to replicate the student experience.
- We will run EZProxy in parallel with OpenAthens until the end of 2022 so some EZproxy links will continue to work until then. They will all need to be updated for 2023.

The School Locker Semester 2 Process & Deadlines

The School Locker requires course resource information at a minimum 10 weeks prior to the start of classes for an academic period. Any information provided after this cut-off will still be processed but The School Locker may not be able to make stock available before classes commence.

Stationery and science items that are specific to student learning requirements can be stocked on campus or students can visit one of The School Locker superstores and shop from a larger range. Students are also able to access the full range online and request home delivery when they shop on The School Locker website.

The resource request process

Teaching staff are required to request the resources their student require for their course for The School Locker to acquire.

- 1. Raise a resource request using the <u>online form</u>.
- 2. The School Locker team will process the request and communicate using the Service Desk email if required.
- 3. Resources are listed on the website under the course code and a link is emailed to the lecturer or course coordinator to review.
- 4. Stock is ordered and available in store or online.

From safety goggles and lab coats to a range of calculators and art supplies, if it is on your students' required resource list, it is at The School Locker.

Ensure all Zoom recordings are stored in Echo 360

Staff are reminded that all recorded academic materials should be stored in Echo 360, not Zoom cloud storage. Echo360 has unlimited storage, persistent links, and a higher quality of video playback and is therefore the preferred storage for all academic recordings. ACU's Zoom storage is nearing capacity, after two years of widespread usage, and there will be a drive to clean this up in the coming months so staff are asked to please ensure that your Zoom recordings have been transferred to Echo360 (this should happen automatically for most academic staff) and remove any out-of-date recordings from Zoom.

Instructions on how to do this are available here:

- <u>Download recording from Zoom</u>
- Upload recording into Echo 360.

Additionally:

- It is good practice to rename the recording in Echo360 when it is created to something sensible so that it is easy to find and use in the future. Use the unit short code and a short description in the name.
- Always link to your Echo360 recording, not the recording stored in Zoom cloud.
- If you cannot find a Zoom recording in your Echo360 library, you can <u>download the recording from Zoom</u> and <u>upload it into Echo360</u>.
- As always, check for broken links in LEO before the start of each semester.

Changes to Adobe PDF experience at ACU

As you may have seen in the <u>ACU Staff Bulletin</u>, there have recently been some changes to the Adobe PDF experience at ACU. Due to unsustainable licensing changes enforced by Adobe, Adobe Pro (legacy) was replaced with Adobe Acrobat Reader for all staff.

This means that by default, PDFs can no longer be edited, modified, annotated, or converted to other files formats such as Word or Excel. If you need to continue editing PDFs, you can request a license to a new version of Adobe Acrobat DC Pro via an Adobe Creative Cloud, as a limited number of licenses will be made available to staff with a legitimate ongoing need to edit and modify PDFs.

If you need to request a license, follow these instructions to <u>request at Adobe ID and download Adobe Acrobat DC</u> <u>Pro from the Adobe Creative Cloud app</u>.

Early Warning System (EWS)

The Centre for Education and Innovation will be piloting the Early Warning System (EWS) across the university in Semester 2. It is a collaborative project between CEI, OPSM, Student Systems and the Faculties.

The EWS uses the <u>SEAtS Software</u> and will be used by Faculty to implement targeted activities and interventions to proactively reduce attrition and enrich engagement with the university. The system connects data from existing data systems (e.g. LMS, Banner) to determine lead indicators for retention and engagement. CEI is currently working on structures to support staff who will be engaging with the EWS and will be reaching out to those staff shortly. In the pilot stage we will engage with faculty staff and course coordinators to best determine how to use the system. No interventions will be implemented until 2023 and will be determined by the faculties via the pilot.

Canvas is coming to ACU!

On 23 May VCAC approved the Business Case to implement Canvas for the whole of ACU. Canvas was selected as the next generation of Learning Management System (LMS) for ACU in 2021 and has already been implemented to support ACU Online.

Canvas will replace the Moodle LMS as part of the overall Learning Environment and will bring a great new interface and experience for Students and Staff. The project will migrate learning content from Moodle to Canvas and design how Canvas will support Learning and Teaching at ACU. The planned delivery will see Post Grad Units ready for students and staff in Semester 2, 2023 and all remaining units migrated ready to start in 2024.

Right now, we are building the project team and you can expect to hear more about the project soon.

INSPIRE in 2022

As educators all of us share the common goal of providing high quality learning experiences for our students. To do this we need to be aware of the latest information to improve students' outcomes. Finding, reviewing, and critically evaluating the mountain of information out there is time consuming, particularly when much of what is presented is not academically robust. None of us have time to sift through the literature to come up with what practices we should adopt and which we should avoid.

This is where <u>INSPIRE</u> fills the gap by empowering educators to implement the highest-level evidence-based learning and teaching practices, with the best interests of students at heart.

We have done the hard yards for you by summarising the latest evidence into bite sized and immediately applicable chunks, freeing up your valuable time to confidently incorporate best practice recommendations.

INSPIRE 2022 has a number of innovative ways that we can support you to use the best available information to inform your teaching practices.

- We have an <u>INSPIRE teams site</u> that you can join and chat with like-minded staff and be part of an ever growing community of practice within ACU;
- We have the INPIRE Toolkit for you to explore and experiment with (feedback and your experiences welcome);
- We have **INSPIRE Ambassadors** representing each of the faculties of the University who are curating, creating, and disseminating the evidence and expanding the evidence-based toolkit.
- We are positioned within the <u>Centre of Education and Innovation</u> in the role of the evidence-based arm all the CEI teams are working towards education innovation in evidence-based teaching practices.

Making the most of your feedback to students

As Semester 1 comes to an end, please let students know that they can bring assessment feedback to consultations with an academic skills advisor to discuss how to further develop their skills. Consultations are available during the non-teaching period and students can continue to work through the Academic Skills Unit (ASU) online resources at their own pace. 24/7 online study support, as provided by Studiosity, also remains accessible via the Writing Feedback and Connect Live services.

Designing accessible online resources

The LEO working party within the <u>Academic Skills Unit</u> presented to AALL (Association for Academic Language and Learning) members on designing accessible online learning resources. Nearly 100 attendees from all over Australia and New Zealand listened and participated in discussions as the team explored "Designing accessible online resources: What does this mean? What is involved? How do you do it?". A recording of the session with accompanying resources can be found on the <u>AALL website</u>.

New unit mode communications

In 2023, there will be some changes to the unit delivery modes, also known as Banner section codes.

From next year:

- the Banner section code '7: Online' will be replaced by 'OU: Online Unscheduled'
- a new code 'OS: Online Scheduled' will be introduced.

These changes will clarify expectations about attendance for students and accommodate changes in the way that units are delivered as a result of COVID. They will also make timetabling easier and clearer for staff.

After widespread consultation, the definitions of all delivery modes have also been updated and standardised:

C - On Campus (was Attendance)

Most learning activities or classes are delivered at a scheduled time, on campus or approved ACU delivery site, to enable in-person interactions. Activities will appear in a student's timetable.

M - Multi-mode

Learning activities are delivered through a planned mix of online and in-person classes, which may include fullday sessions and/or placements, to enable interaction. Activities that require attendance will appear in a student's timetable.

OU - Online unscheduled (was 7 - Online)

Learning activities are accessible anytime, anywhere. These units are normally delivered fully online and will not appear in a student's timetable.

OS - Online scheduled (new)

All class activities are held online, at scheduled times, and will require some attendance to enable online interaction. Activities will appear in a student's timetable.

These standardised definitions will be made available to students via the ACU website, the student portal, and elsewhere.

Student Administration staff are contacting key Faculty staff about the process for requesting updates to CRNs. Timetable and Room Bookings will be working with TLOs to make sure that the new modes are timetabled correctly.

Leganto reading lists are a great way to streamline access and make it easy for students to find articles, ebooks, and other resources in your LEO and Canvas units. Leganto reading lists are simple to create – Library staff can set them up for you or show you how it's done.

Readings looking a little dated? We can help you source current and relevant resources and make sure your lists include the latest editions.

During the second half of 2022 we will be moving to a new authentication system for accessing library resources remotely. A Leganto reading list will make this transition simple – saving you time and effort. All staff members (new, sessional, continuing) are welcome to contact the <u>Library</u> to find out how we can help reduce your workload today.

ACEN Webinar: Diversity and inclusion: Insights from the GOS on WIL outcomes & participation for different student groups.

This webinar draws on the ACEN Graduate Outcomes Survey data from 2020 and 2021 to explore WIL participation and outcomes across different student groups. More specifically, it will examine:

- Participation in different types of WIL during university years among graduates from varying backgrounds.
- How different types of WIL influence the employment outcomes of recent graduates from varying backgrounds.
- How different WIL activities impact on graduate perceptions of their preparedness for work, and variations by background characteristics.

In addition to the traditional equity groups, the webinar will focus on WIL participation and outcomes by citizenship and age. The webinar should provide important insights for educators and practitioners interested in access, diversity and inclusion, along with those responsible for designing and delivering inclusive WIL.

Learning & Teaching Policies Update

The Learning and Teaching Policy Development Working Group (established in December 2020) comprised of approximately 35 stakeholders from across the University, met on 6 May to discuss the first draft of the revised Assessment Procedures. The Procedures are to accompany the draft Assessment Policy which has received in principle support from Academic Board.

The working group provided invaluable feedback, and this is being considered with specific attention to clarity of language and the student perspective. The draft will then be mapped against the existing Assessment Procedures and linkages made to other relevant policies/procedures. An updated draft will be circulated to this group for further consideration, and for tabling at schools and other teaching areas. Professor Whitty is meeting with students in early July to discuss a number of learning and teaching matters including the draft Assessment Policy and Procedures.

A team from CEI has also begun scoping the Learning and Teaching Procedures. This work involves consideration of a wide range of issues including Graduate Attributes, the new LMS and educational analytics. Several other policies due for review are being considered within the drafting of the procedures as part of the cross-Directorate Policy Consolidation project. Both sets of procedures are being developed with a high-quality student journey as their focus.

Update on Core Curriculum Arrangements

Earlier this year, there were some important changes to quality assurance and administrative arrangements for ACU's <u>Core Curriculum</u>, following its integration last year into Faculty of Theology & Philosophy.

Academic and Administrative Oversight for UNCC100 and UNCC300

Overall academic oversight of the 'Catholic Social Thought' stream – UNCC100 (Self and Community) and UNCC300 (Justice & Change in a Global World) – is now provided by Core Curriculum Co-ordinator, Dr Zach Duke (Strathfield campus), assisted by a small team that includes Dr Blake Wassell (also Strathfield campus). This includes matters such as extension and special consideration applications, credit applications, and student appeals. Zach is also the Academic Integrity officer for these units. Administrative support (including timetabling, sessional contracts, and results) continues to be provided by Mr Justin Ansell (Senior Administrative Officer for the Core) and his team.

Our sincere thanks to the outgoing Faculty Academic Liaisons – Ms Laurine Hurley (FHS), Dr Amy McPherson (FEA) and Dr Thuy-Linh Nguyen (FLB) – for their exceptional work on the Core, over a lengthy period, in support of our students.

Unit Updates

Both UNCC100 and UNCC300 have been recently updated in collaboration with all faculties. Without amending the focus or character of the units, the alignment of learning outcomes with assessment structures has been adjusted, and the representative texts and references list has been updated. The units now provide students with enhanced resourcing via Leganto reading lists in LEO. Assessment tasks have been framed more specifically with a view to allowing better opportunities to demonstrate achievement against learning outcomes, while also limiting opportunities for Academic Integrity breaches. Marking rubrics are also somewhat more discriminating in mapping achievement levels against learning outcomes.

Philosophy Stream

Alongside these 'Catholic Social Thought' units (UNCC100 and UNCC300), students continue to have the alternative option of undertaking one or both of the 'Philosophy' Core units (PHCC102 Being Human, PHCC104 Ethics & the Good Life, and PHCC320 The Just Society). These Philosophy options continue on the basis of significant growth in 2021.

Academic Integrity

Recently both the <u>Staff</u> and <u>Student</u> Academic Integrity webpages have become available. In addition, formative modules have just become available on LEO for students. These include modules investigating in more detail aspects such as the dangers of sharing materials online, and helping students distinguish between legitimate collaboration and collusion. These modules are available for all, but can also be assigned by Academic Integrity Officers as compulsory education for students who have performed academic misconduct. Canvas LMS Project Update

Over the next 2 years ACU will be transitioning our Learning Management System (LMS) from Moodle to Canvas and it's already been a big start to the year for the project!

Canvas will provide staff and students with an easy-to-use, visually appealing, well-organised, mobile-friendly experience that will reduce administrative burden and bring more focus to high-quality student experiences. Canvas will be better integrated with ACU's core systems (e.g. CMAS, Banner), to promote consistency of information and reduce duplication of work.

Troy Severino was appointed Senior Program Manager in the CEI in December 2021, he has been working with David Heath (CEI) and Maciek Kusnierz (IT) to commence the project. Already in 2022, the project team have held

approximately 20 workshops with over 100 people, including faculty and directorate staff, system administrators, Canvas staff, and another Australian University that transitioned from Moodle to Canvas. The team has appreciated the candid discussion and willingness to actively set this program up for success at ACU. It's clear that staff recognise that there are current challenges and this project is a great opportunity to improve the Student and Staff experience at ACU.

We wanted to share a draft high-level project timeline:

Semester 2, 2023	• Early adoption phase 2 - Large scale early adoption program, with Moodle still available for units that are not ready to transition to Canvas.		
Semester 1, 2024	All units delivered through Canvas		

The work in 2022 will be fundamental to ensuring our first group of early adopters can begin building units in a Canvas environment that is ready for ACU's delivery modes, teaching approaches, learning tools and administrative systems.

Academic Integrity

Changes to the <u>Student Academic Integrity and Misconduct Policy and Procedures</u> were approved last year and are being implemented from January 2022. These changes arose out of recommendations from the extensive 2020 review into academic integrity at ACU. You can read the changes <u>here</u>.

There is a major change to the way that allegations of potential misconduct are handled. Academic Integrity Officers (AIO) have been assigned within the Schools/Faculties (or equivalent), and are now responsible for receiving allegations, determining evidence, and applying penalties. A flowchart outlining the process, and template letters to use, <u>are available on the website</u>; together with a list of AIOs.

The Academic Integrity Team (AIT) is a part of the Centre for Education and Innovation and will take responsibility for case management and record keeping.

Another key change is that relevant staff will need to undertake online modules:

- Staff AIM (academic integrity module); and
- Assessment marker training

More details about the staff modules will be provided when they become available for completion; no action is required at this time.

Administrative Services Update from Student Administration

Admissions

Admissions to Semester 1 2022 will close for direct application on 14 February and final rounds in the TACs follow in the last week of the month. Any student wishing to transfer to a different course and/or campus can apply via the My Enrolment tab in Student Connect if they have completed at least two units in the degree.

More information on this process for commencing students and the relevant <u>Alternate Offer</u> or <u>Internal Transfer</u> resources can be found on the ACU website with assistance available through AskACU.

Transfers for semester 2 open in early April and close 31 May 2022.

Examinations & Results

Central examinations will be hosted online for Semester 1, 2022. Schools can also request to centrally schedule inperson practical exams (e.g. OSCE's or Oral Assessments) to help reduce examination clashes for students. Room bookings and invigilators must be organised by the School for any in-person/practical exams

Centrally Coordinated Scheduling Options for Semester 1, 2022

- 1. Practical Exam (OSCE or Oral Assessment no paper upload required & run by the school)
- 2. Proctored LEO Quiz (Proctorio)
- 3. LEO Quiz with Safe Exam Browser (browser lockdown)
- 4. Non-proctored LEO Quiz
- 5. LEO Assessment (Assignment or Take-Home via Turn-it-in)
- 6. LEO Quiz & Assessment combination (Safe Exam Browser can be enabled for the quiz if interested)

Please note that Head of School approval is *no longer required* for online proctored exams. Any staff interested must complete the <u>Online Proctoring Questionnaire</u> and be approved prior to submitting their examination request.

Examination requests will be open for two weeks starting 28 February.

Timetabling

As we head into Semester 1, Timetabling is pleased to report that we have an average of 77% of classes on campus this semester, providing the in-person experience our students have been clear they want to return to. A reminder that if extenuating circumstances mean you would like to request a class change from on-campus to online delivery, you must seek approval from the Chief Operating Officer after gaining endorsement from the Executive Dean. The process is as follows:

- Requests can be made via a short email to Executive Deans with a short justification for the change.
- The Executive Deans will assess and where they support the change, forward to the Chief Operating Officer for approval.
- The Chief Operating Officer will then pass the request onto the Timetabling & Room Booking team to action the change.

Business process management training

Business Process Management Training is being offered in the first half of 2022. With an objective to teach staff how to simplify work processes, deliver better services, highlight how you can improve your work and clarify roles. Training will provide an opportunity to improve stakeholder experience, increase efficiency, quality and consistency.

You will also find business process management useful if you are working with lengthy manuals or cumbersome Visio diagrams that can often be difficult to navigate. ACU uses a web-based system, Promapp, to assist with business process management. Promapp can be used to document processes clearly and simply and is easily accessible by your team and other staff.

This training provides an opportunity to enhance your business process management skills and familiarise yourself with ACU's Business Process Management Model.

This training is suitable for anyone responsible for:

- the day-to-day management of processes, known as 'process owners' (usually managers, supervisors, team leaders etc.)
- the day-to-day delivery of processes, known as 'process experts' (usually a staff member in a team who
 routinely performs the process)

- departmental process improvement or business analysis
- both academic and professional staff
